

Short C.V.

Robert E. Baldwin is Hildale Professor of Economics, Emeritus, at the University of Wisconsin-Madison. He received his Ph.D. in Economics from Harvard in 1950 and taught at Harvard and the University of California at Los Angeles before moving to Wisconsin in 1964. He served as Chairperson of the Economics Department at UW-Madison from 1975-78 and chairperson of the Social Systems Research Institute from 1986-89.

Baldwin has published over a hundred theoretical, empirical, and policy-oriented articles in various professional journals and conference volumes in the fields of international trade and economic development. Among the books he has written are: Economic Development: Theory, History, Policy (with Gerald Meier) (1957), Economic Development and Export Growth: A Study of Northern Rhodesia, 1920-1960, (1966), Economic Development and Growth (1966), Nontariff Distortions of International Trade (1970), Foreign Trade Regimes and Economic Development: the Philippines (1975), The Political Economy of U.S. Import Policy (1985), Trade Policy in a Changing World Economy (1988), The Political Economy of U.S.-Taiwan Trade Relations, (1995), Congressional Trade Votes: From NAFTA Approval to Fast-Track Defeat (with C. Magee) (2000), and The Decline of US Labor Unions and the Role of Trade (2000). Edited volumes by Baldwin include The Structure and Evolution of Recent U.S. Trade Policy (1984), Trade Policy Issues and Empirical Analysis (1988) and Issues in U.S.-E.C. Trade Relations (1988), Empirical Studies of Commercial Policy (1991) and Challenges of Globalization: Analyzing the Economics (with L. Alan Winters) (2004). He is or has been on the editorial boards of The American Economic Review, The Review of Economics and Statistics, The Journal of International Economics, The World Economy, Economics and Politics, The Malaysian Journal of Economics, The Journal of Asian Economics, the Atlantic Economic Journal, The Pakistan Development Review, Journal of Economic Integration and Quarterly Review of Economics and Finance.

Baldwin was Chief Economist in the Office of the U.S. Trade Representative (USTR) in Washington in 1963-64 and has served as a consultant on trade matters in the U.S. Department of Labor (1975-76), the United Nations Conference on Trade and Development (1975), the World Bank (1978-79), and the Organization for Economic Cooperation and Development (1988, 1993 and 1997). He has also been a consultant to the Committee for Economic Development, the U.S. Chamber of Commerce, and the Atlantic Council. From 1991-1992, he served as chair of the Panel on Foreign Trade Statistics for the National Academy of Science's Committee on National Trade Statistics, and was President of the Midwest Economics Association in 1995.

He is a Research Associate at the National Bureau of Economic Research. In addition, he is a member of the Council on Foreign Relations and is on the Advisory Committee of the Institute for International Economics. He is also a Fellow of the American Academy of Arts and Sciences and in 2001 was appointed to an international panel of experts to advise the Director-General of the World Trade Organization, Mike Moore. He serves on the Executive Committee of the Program for International Studies in Asia and on the International Advisory Board for Ukraine for the Economics Education and Research Consortium.
